PART ONE

17. Declarations of Interest

No declarations were made at the meeting.

18. Minutes of the meeting held on 15 October 2020

Under the membership item in the minutes, it was felt that the two vacant seats for the maintained primary and secondary academies should be advertised to provide as much representation as possible. It was agreed that these would be advertised as soon as possible and prior to the scheduled May election timeframe.

It was reported that the constitutional review would be considered at the next meeting of the forum in March.

A question was asked on page 3 of the minutes, final paragraph under 'Notices of Concern' and those schools who may have set a robust budget prior to Covid-19 but who may now find themselves in financial deficit at the end of the financial year. It was reported that the DfE, in their guidance to schools had referred to Local Authority (LA) providing support, however, officers were not aware of any additional funding available to schools. Officers had contacted the DfE to understand what their expectations were and where funding would come from, particularly for the additional costs that go beyond those that could be claimed for, such as staffing cost over summer or free school meals. A response was awaited.

Under items 11 and 12, 'Primary Behaviour Support Services and Minority Ethnic Achievement Services' it was noted that the Forums Resolution should refer to financial year 2021-22 not 2020-21.

On page 2, item 5 'Matters arising' it was noted that the last paragraph should read 'and, as agreed, the 2018/19 **unspent contingency** had been......'

It was noted that the Executive summaries had not been provide in reports for this meeting as previously requested but would be in the future.

RESOLVED –

- a) That 'underspend' be changed to 'unspent contingency' in the last line of item 5;
- b) Under minute items 11 and 12, (Primary Behaviour Support Services and Minority Ethnic Achievement Services) should refer to 2021-22 not 2020-21 in the resolution.
- c) That subject to the amendments above, the minutes of the Schools Forum held on 15 October 2020 be confirmed and signed by the Chairman.
- d) That the current vacant seats for the maintained primary and secondary academies places be advertised prior to the normal election of members in May 2021.

19. Decisions taken by the Chairman under delegated powers

The Chairman reported that the only decision he had made relating to business of the Forum had been to conduct this meeting via Teams rather than face to face.

20. Notices of Concern

It was noted that the 'Notice of Concern' issued to Western Springs Primary School had been withdrawn following their conversion to academy status on 1st November 2020. There had been no new notices of concern or licensed deficits issued since the last meeting.

RESOLVED – That the report be noted.

21. High Needs Block Update

The Forum considered the report of the Deputy Chief Executive and Director for Families and Communities which provided a detailed update on the High Needs Block funding. Members of the Forum were informed that the forecast overspend on the 2020/21 High Needs Block (HNB) was now £5.5m which was significantly worse than previously forecast but was in line with previous historic overspends. The Forum were reminded that at the time of setting the budget it was thought that the budget would enable the LA to improve the offer to special schools in line with maintained schools for the first time in several years. There was also additional investment through the newly formed Locality Hubs. The Education, Health and Care Plans (EHCP) backlog had meant significant additional financial pressure across all school sectors and there had been an increase in the number of children with higher and more expensive needs. The impact of this meant that at the end of the current financial year the overall DSG reserve would be in deficit.

At the last meeting the Schools Forum had agreed a 'deficit recovery management plan' which used surplus Growth Fund money, set against the Dedicated Schools Grant (DSG) reserve. This would be monitored closely to see if further action was necessary.

The Forum was reminded that the Government had reaffirmed their commitment to increase the school budget by £7.1 billion. Subject to confirmation of funding levels, initial estimates were that the Council would, with a contribution from the Growth Fund allocation, be able to fund in full, the National Funding Formula (NFF) for schools in 2021/22.

The report listed the reasons for the increase in demand on the HNB. It was explained that this was a general list, some of which had more relevance to this year than others, for example there had been less permanent exclusions this year from mainstream schools but over a longer time period this had had a significant effect on the budget. The extension of the age group to 25 years for those with EHCP's had been introduced a number of years ago.

The first meeting of the High Block Needs Working Group had been convenience and had met during the previous week. A copy of the notes of that meeting had been emailed to the group for information. Claire Evans and the Chairman were members of the working group and informed members of the usefulness of the group and its intention to meet and share information and try to come up with manageable suggestions for more efficient use of the HNB.

It was requested that all members of the Forum email their thoughts to the Assistant Director for Education Strategy and Improvement who would collate and circulate to the forum. Following a question of the implementation timescales of any recommendations made by the working group, officers informed the Forum that they would be writing out to schools within the next few weeks with the settlement and matrix level funding for next year. Any recommendations made by the working group would be fed into conversations on the Education banding tool (next report on the agenda) and introduced in 2022/23.

The report also outlined the School funding settlement for 2021/22. The £2.2b uplift nationally, against all the key funding blocks meant that Staffordshire schools block had increased to £529.9m, an increase of £19.1m or 3.7% which should meant that in 2021/21 the LA should be able to fund in full the National Funding Formula. The High Needs Block funding would be £101.01m an increase of £11.06m on the previous year. The rates to be applied next year will be reported to the Schools Forum at the March 2021 report.

The Early Years Block had increased to £50.548m an increase of £0.681m or 1.4%. This allocation was based on the January 2020 census and there was still an intention from Government to use the January 2021 census which would be adjusted in July 2021. It was felt that the risk was that the census number of children will be low due to the pandemic and work was taking place with Government to ensure that this did not

adversely affect the overall level of funding. There was concern that there were 4,000 less places taken up in nursery places due to key workers taking president and the effect this would have on next year funding. Officers had made representations to Government and there had been reassurances that the LA will not be penalised by the potentially low figures and that as children return to nursery there would be funding. Continued representations would continue to be made.

Following a question on how the early years funding would be passed out to providers, the Forum was informed that Officers were currently waiting to hear what the Governments funding position would be. The LA intention would be to pass out the rises to the sector as in previous years, but there may need to be a larger continency if there wasn't clarity from the Government. Officers would make contact with the Forum as soon as more information was available, and a meeting would be arranged if it was felt appropriate.

Following a question on the prudential commitment to borrowing for SEND. the Forum were reminded that this was long term and had approximately 10/15 years left to repay. The backlog of EHCP's had been largely cleared but it was not yet clear how many had failed due to time obligations which were a result of LA delays.

RESOLVED – That:

- a) The update on the High Needs Block since the previous report in October 2020 be noted;
- b) That the latest Dedicated Schools Grant Government settlement be noted.
- c) Members of the Forum email their thoughts to the Assistant Director for Education Strategy and Improvement who would collate responses and circulate to the forum.

22. Education Banding Tool

The Forum heard that currently the Education High Needs Block top-up funding varied between educational settings as there was inconsistency in the assessment criteria across the sectors. The report explained the current funding formula.

The Local Authority had decided to introduce an Education Banding Tool across mainstream, special school and further education providers to calculate the education element of the top-up funding for children and young people with Education Health and Care Plans (EHCP's).

The toolkit was a single algorithm which would answer a number of assessment questions around a child's needs and would produce a banding level which would create the right level of top up funding and would be an equitable and consistent mechanism of funding across all the sectors. The needs profile for a child applying for an EHCP would be completed by the SEND Key worker who carries out the assessment.

The toolkit was not designed to reduce funding, but it would inevitably lead to some increases and some decreases. The level of protection offered to schools would need to be considered by the implementation group. It was expected that the banding levels would be reviewed each year. Full consultation would be carried out prior to the implementation.

The software company chosen to provide the toolkit was Imosphere. A presentation by Imosphere had been given to partners, including School Forum members in January 2020. A draft implementation programme was outlined in the report with the planned implementation date being April 2022. It was noted that a full implementation plan would be prepared and shared with all stakeholders prior to implementation. If Members of the Schools Forum had any nominations to help with the plan, they were asked to email the Senior Commissioning Manager with their role and contact details.

A question was asked on the current funding criteria and if split site funding was still included. The meeting was informed that a number of schools still benefited from the split site allowance and it was part of the national funding formula.

RESOLVED –

- a) That the introduction of an Education Banding Toolkit across mainstream, special schools and further education providers to calculate the education element of the top-up funding for children and young people with EHCP's was noted.
- b) Any nominations to sit on the Implementation Plan group be emailed to the Senior Commissioning Manager (Lesley Calverley).

23. Work Programme

It was felt that the work programme was not meeting expectations. It needed to be forward looking; include standard items; and act as a reminder for those items which the Forum had raised as issues but for which no information or feedback was yet available.

RESOLVED – That the Work Programme be noted and developed to include standard and pending items.

24. Date of next meeting

Staffordshire Schools Forum Constitution

Executive Summary:

- The Staffordshire Schools Forum constitution was previously updated in July 2019
- Schools Forum requested a further review as part of the 2020/ 2021 work programme
- Following the amendments made they are presented for approval at the meeting of Schools Forum in March 2021
- The following amendments have been made:
- Consideration of apologies at meetings and actions for non-attendance at 3 consecutive meetings for schools members and non-schools members;
- Election of the Chair and Vice Chair will take place at the final meeting of the school year, for a period of two years;
- Subject to the decision of the Forum the process for electing the Chair and Vice Chair;
- A shortened timescale for the selection, nomination and appointment of schools members;
- An additional appendix (Appendix C) which sets out when and how the termly review of maintained and academy school representatives is undertaken.

Recommendations:

That Schools Forum:

- 1. Notes the amendments to the Staffordshire Schools Forum Constitution.
- 2. Agrees to adopt the amended Staffordshire Schools Forum Constitution subject to the following decision to be taken by the Forum
- 3. Does Schools Forum agree to:
- a) Nominations for Chair and Vice Chair are received in advance of final meeting of the school year. Nominations, with a pen portrait, would be submitted 7 days before the publication of Schools Forum papers. These would be emailed to Schools Forum members in preparation for the election (if required) at the meeting. Where no nominations are received, nominations can be made at the meeting; or.
- b) Nominations for Chair and Vice Chair are received under the agenda item at the final meeting of the school year. The election (if required) would take place as part of that agenda item.

Report of Deputy Chief Executive and Director for Families and Communities

<u>PART A</u>

Reasons for recommendations:

4. Following the adoption of the Staffordshire Schools Forum constitution in July 2019, schools forum requested a further review of the constitution and any amendments be brought back to the Forum for approval and adoption.

PART B

Background

- 5. The Staffordshire Schools Forum constitution updated in July 2019 was in line with the Schools Forum (England) Regulations 2012 and where necessary had regard to the Education and Skills Funding Agency operational and good practice guide, copies of which are on the Schools Forum website.
- 6. Following the agreement at the meeting of Schools Forum in October 2020, a further review of the constitution was undertaken by the Chair and Vice Chair of the Forum along with officers of the Council.
- 7. The majority of the constitution agreed in July 2019 remains in place, however there have been some amendments which affect all members along with changes to the election of the Chair and Vice Chair.
- 8. Paragraph 3.6 has been added to the constitution to address the attendance of Schools Forum members. The constitution now states that where a member is absent for 3 consecutive meetings and apologies have not been accepted by the Forum, the Council will terminate their appointment and will undertake the appropriate nomination, election and appointment process.
- 9. It is proposed that the election of the Chair and Vice Chair will take place at the final meeting (usually July) of the school year for a period of two years, but they will not take up their appointments until the first Schools Forum meeting in the new school year (usually October) following their election. This is to allow for a smooth transition between chairs and to aid the continuity and efficiency of Schools Forum.
- 10. Following the review, it has been agreed to seek the views of Schools Forum members in relation to the nomination process of both the Chair and Vice Chair. Two options are proposed and recorded in the recommendations at the beginning of this paper. As agreed in constitution we would like to arrive at a decision by consensus.

Option A

Nominations for Chair and Vice Chair are received by the Clerk in advance of final meeting of the school year. Nominations, with pen portrait, must be submitted at least 7 days prior to the publication of Schools Forum papers. Names of the nominees, along with the pen portraits, would be emailed to Schools Forum members in preparation for the election (if required) at the

meeting. Where no nominations are received prior to the meeting, nominations will be sought at the meeting.

Option B

Nominations for Chair and Vice Chair are received under the agenda item at the final meeting of the school year. The election (if required) would take place as part of that agenda item.

- 11. The agreed option will be included within the constitution at paragraph 4.16
- 12. The timescale for the selection, nomination and appointment of schools and academies members has been shortened. Each part of the process is now 2 working weeks.
- 13. Appendix C has been included which sets out when and how the termly review of maintained and academy school representatives is undertaken.

CONSTITUTION

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1 INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 The Education Act 2002, amended the School Standards and Framework Act 1998, to require each Local Authority (LA) to establish a Schools Forum, its function being to advise the LA on matters relating to their Schools Budget and to advise the LA or be a consultative body in relation to other prescribed matters. Currently, the <u>Schools</u> Forums (England) Regulations 2012 (as amended) regulate the composition, constitution and procedures of a Schools Forum.
- 1.2 Although made up mainly of representatives from maintained schools and academies, it can also include "non-school" members, representing relevant bodies.
- 1.3 Within Staffordshire County Council, such non-school representation includes Diocesan representatives, representatives from the Early Years PVI Sector, representatives from 16-19 Education, representatives from the authority's School Consultative Groups and a Parent Governor representative from the Prosperous Staffordshire Select Committee.
- 1.4 As elected members attend these meetings as observers, the Schools Forum forms an important link back into political decision making processes.

2 ESTABLISHMENT OF THE SCHOOLS FORUM

2.1 Staffordshire County Council ("the Council") has established and will maintain a Schools Forum ("the Forum") in accordance with the requirements of section 47A of the School Standards and Framework Act 1998, and subsequent regulations as may be amended from time to time.

3 MEMBERSHIP

General

- 3.1 The Forum will usually have a maximum of thirty two (32) members, composed of those persons specified in Appendix A. However, in order to accommodate the rate of academy conversions, the size of the Forum may be temporarily increased in order to appoint additional academy representatives, then take out maintained school representative vacancies when one arises.
- 3.2 At least two-thirds of the total membership will consist of maintained school and academy representatives; the proportion of maintained and academy primary and maintained and academy secondary members being broadly comparable to the pupil numbers in each of these categories.
- 3.3 Detailed in Appendix C is the process undertaken by the local authority at the beginning of the second week in September, January and April each year in order to ensure the

numbers of schools representatives are broadly comparable to the pupil numbers in each category.

- 3.4 The Council shall maintain a record of the composition of the Forum, including:
 - (a) The number of schools members and by which group or sub-group they were elected;
 - (b) The number of academies members; and
 - (c) The number of non-schools members, their terms of office, how they were chosen and whom they represent.

School Members Term of Office

- 3.5 Schools members are appointed to the Forum for a term of 4 years in most cases unless agreement has been reached to the contrary. To ensure continuity of experience within the Forum membership, elections will be held every 2 years and, where appropriate, half of the representatives of each group will be appointed on each election date. The details of the election process is set out in Appendix B. However, where the school of a maintained school representative has converted to an academy, the Forum could consider appointing this member as an academies member until their current term of office ends.
- 3.6 To ensure the effectiveness of the decision making process surrounding the use of public money, all Schools Forum members are expected to attend the Forum meetings. Apologies must be made in advance of each meeting. Members' apologies will be considered at the Forum meeting and accepted if agreed by the majority of attending members. Where a member has not attended 3 consecutive meetings of Schools Forum and apologies have not been formally accepted, the Council will terminate their appointment and will undertake the appropriate nomination, election and appointment process.
- 3.7 A schools member will cease to be a member of the Forum:
 - (a) if they resign from their position on the Forum by giving written notice to the Council;
 - (b) upon the expiry of their term of office;
 - (c) in the event of their death;
 - (d) if they cease to hold the office by virtue of which the member became eligible for election, selection or appointment to the Forum, except where the provisions of paragraph 3.5 apply;
 - (e) if the Council terminates their appointment because the member has not attended 3 consecutive meetings of Schools Forum and apologies have not been formally accepted by the Forum; or
 - (f) if the Council terminates their appointment because it has been instructed to do so by the Secretary of State.

Non-Schools Members Term of Office

- 3.8 The Council will seek nominations for non-schools members from the relevant bodies as identified in Appendix A. The Council will normally ask the relevant bodies to nominate non-school members every four years. Existing non-school members shall continue until a replacement is appointed.
- 3.9 A non-schools member will cease to be a member of the Forum:
 - (a) if they resign from their position on the Forum;
 - (b) when the relevant body makes a further nomination to replace him/her and the Council appoints him/her;
 - (c) in the event of their death;
 - (d) if they cease to hold the office by virtue of which the member became eligible for election, selection or appointment to the Forum;
 - (e) if the Council terminates their appointment because the member has not attended 3 consecutive meetings of Schools Forum and apologies have not been formally accepted by the Forum;
 - (f) if the Council terminates their appointment because it has been instructed to do so by the Secretary of State.
- 3.10 No person who is an executive member or relevant officer of the authority is eligible to be nominated as a non-schools member. A "relevant officer" refers to:
 - a) the director of children's services of the authority,
 - b) any officer employed or engaged to work under the management of the director of children's services, other than one who directly provides education to children or who manages such a person, or
 - c) any officer whose work involves management of, or advice on, school funding.
- 3.11 The Council will arrange for vacancies on the Forum to be filled using the nomination, election and appointment processes detailed below.

Schools Members – Nomination, Election and Appointment

3.12 The Council will appoint as schools representatives those persons duly elected and nominated via the following process (and outlined on the Schools Forum Website).

Maintained Schools Members:

- 3.13 School members must be elected to the Schools Forum by the members of the relevant group, or sub-group, in the Council's area. The groups are:
 - (a) Representatives of nursery schools (where there are any such schools in the Council's area);
 - (b) Representatives of primary schools other than nursery schools (where there are any such schools in the Council's area);
 - (c) Representatives of secondary schools (where there are any such schools in the

Council's area);

- (d) Representatives of special schools (where there are any such schools in the Council's area);
- (e) Representatives of pupil referral units (where there are any such schools in the Council's area).

Academies Members:

- 3.14 Academies members must be elected to the Forum by the proprietors of academies in the Council's area.
 - (a) Representatives of primary academies other than nursery schools;
 - (b) Representatives of secondary academies;
 - (c) Representatives of special academies (where there are any such schools in the Council's area);
 - (d) Representatives of academy pupil referral units (where there are any such schools in the Council's area).

Election Procedure

- 3.15 For maintained schools, in the event that there is more than one candidate for a vacant position or a position which is subject to election in that year within any of the groups set out in paragraph 3.13, the head teacher and chair of governors of every school within the relevant group will be invited to vote for one (1) candidate each. For each position, the candidate who receives the largest number of votes will, subject to paragraphs 3.19 and 3.20, be appointed to that position and the candidate who receives the second largest number of votes will be appointed, subject to paragraphs 3.19 and 3.20, if the candidate who receives the largest number of votes also receives the largest number of votes for another group in which they stood for election.
- 3.16 For academies, in the event that there is more than one candidate for a vacant position or a position which is subject to election in that year within any of the groups set out in paragraph 3.14, the proprietors of mainstream academies of every school within the relevant group will be invited to vote for one (1) candidate each. For each position, the candidate who receives the largest number of votes will, subject to paragraph 3.19 and 3.20, be appointed to that position and the candidate who receives the second largest number of votes will be appointed, subject to paragraphs 3.19 and 3.20, if the candidate who receives the largest number of votes also receives the largest number of votes for another group in which they stood for election.
- 3.17 In the event that two or more candidates for a position receive an equal number of votes or if for any reason an election for a position does not take place by the timescales set out in the election schedule set out on the Schools Forum website the Forum must appoint a member to the Forum instead.

- 3.18 In the event that there is only one candidate for a vacant position or a position which is subject to election in that year within any of the groups set out in paragraphs 3.13 and 3.14, it will not be necessary for members to vote, and that candidate will, subject to paragraphs 3.19 and 3.20, be appointed to the position.
- 3.19 In the event that there are no applications from any of the groups of schools subject to an election in that year, then the Forum members who represent the relevant group which has the vacancy shall nominate the representative to be appointed. Where the vacancy is for the single representative for the relevant group, i.e. there are no other members to make a nomination, then the Forum will seek to appoint the member from that group of schools.
- 3.20 It is not appropriate for a candidate to be elected to represent more than one group, however, they may stand for election from any group(s) but can only be appointed to represent one of the groups.
- 3.21 The Council reserves the right not to appoint any person duly entitled by the processes above, for any reason.
- [**NOTE:** Proprietor in relation to an academy means the person or body of persons responsible for the management of the academy].

Non-schools Members – Nomination and Appointment

- 3.22 The Council will seek nominations for non-schools members from the relevant bodies identified in Appendix A and in accordance with the schedule set out on the Schools Forum website.
- 3.23 Upon receipt of a nomination under paragraph 3.21, the Council will:
 - (a) make an appointment pursuant to that nomination; or
 - (b) provide the relevant body with the grounds on which they determine not to make such an appointment.
- 3.24 Where the Council has proceeded under paragraph 3.22(b), 3.9(e) or 3.9(f) it will seek a further nomination from the relevant body concerned.
- 3.25 Through publication on the Schools Forum website the Council will inform all maintained schools and academies in its area of the name of the member appointed as a non-schools member and the name of the relevant body that that member represents, within one month of the appointment.

4 PROCEEDINGS OF SCHOOLS FORUM

Meetings

- 4.1 The Forum must:
 - (a) hold a meeting at least four (4) times in each academic year;
 - (b) agree where meetings should take place and the time of its meetings;
 - (c) hold a meeting in response to a request from:
 (i) one-third of its members; or
 (ii) the Chair, provided that this does not conflict with any directions given by the Forum.
 - (d) hold meetings in public, but visitors should be asked to leave if confidential items are discussed, unless the Forum have asked them to take part in a specific discussion.
- 4.2 The Council shall agree the frequency and timing of meetings of the Forum in consultation with the Forum in advance of each academic year. Whilst setting out the cycle of meetings, where possible, the Council will provide a clear overview of key consultative and decision-making points in the school funding cycle.

Substitutes

- 4.3 In the event that a member is unable to attend any meeting, that member may seek the Chair's permission no later than 48 hours prior to the meeting, subject to paragraph 4.4, to have a named substitute attending in their place, and such permission will not be unreasonably withheld.
- 4.4 The notice period referred to in paragraph 4.3 is waived where substitution is in respect of a meeting where levels of delegation are subject to a vote of the Schools Forum and no notice period should apply in these circumstances.
- 4.5 A named substitute will have the same rights as a member of the Forum.

Local Authority Officers, Observers & Visitors

- 4.6 The following persons shall be entitled to speak at such meetings even though they are not members of the Forum:
 - (a) the Director responsible for education and children's services or their representative;
 - (b) the Section 151 Officer or their representative;
 - (c) any elected member of the authority who has primary responsibility for children's services or education in the authority;
 - (d) any elected member of the authority who has primary responsibility for the resources of the authority;
 - (e) any person who is invited by the Forum to attend in order to provide financial or technical advice to the Forum;
 - (f) an observer appointed by the Secretary of State; and
 - (g) any person presenting a paper or other item to the Forum that is on the

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meeting's agenda, but that person's right to speak shall be limited to matters related to the item that the person is presenting.

Quorum

4.7 The Forum will be quorate if at least forty percent (40%) (rounded up to a whole number) of the total current membership in position is present at a meeting, except where paragraph 4.21(d) applies.

Decisions

- 4.8 The Forum will unless otherwise stated within this document, arrive at its decisions by consensus.
- 4.9 However, if it is necessary to take a vote the following arrangements apply, subject to paragraph 4.10:
 - (a) every member of the Forum will have one (1) vote;
 - (b) a resolution will be passed by simple majority, subject to the following provision; and
 - (c) where there are an equal number of votes for and against a proposal, the Chair will have the casting vote.
- 4.10 Where the vote is in respect of arrangements where voting requirements are set by government regulations, those regulations shall apply. In these circumstances the authority will highlight the voting arrangements which will apply in the Schools Forum papers supporting the vote. Currently, such arrangements include but are not limited to the following:
 - (a) Voting on the funding formula is limited to schools members, academies members and PVI representatives;
 - (b) Voting on de-delegation is limited to the specific primary and secondary phase of maintained schools members; and
 - (c) Voting on retaining funding for statutory duties relating to maintained schools only is limited to maintained primary, secondary, special and PRU group members.
- 4.11 Once a decision has been taken, all members will be bound by it, but any member can ask for their opinion to be recorded in the minutes.

Forum Sub-Groups

4.12 The Forum may establish sub-groups from their membership to consider in detail specific issues on their behalf and report their findings back to them.

Officers:

Chair and Vice Chair:

4.13 The Schools Forum must elect the Chair and Vice Chair from amongst its own

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members. The election of Chair and Vice Chair will take place at the final meeting (usually July) of the school year for a period of two years. Elections will take place only every two years unless either post becomes vacant (see 4.21). The Chair and Vice Chair will hold office until a decision has been reached about their successors at any meeting or until they are no longer members of the Forum.

- 4.14. The Chair and Vice Chair will take up their appointments at the first Schools Forum meeting in the new school year (usually October) following their election. This is to allow for a smooth transition between chairs and to aid the continuity and efficiency of Schools Forum.
- 4.15 Any elected member of the Council or officer of the Council who is a member of the Schools Forum may not be elected as Chair or Vice Chair.
- 4.16 Either Option A or Option B below will be included once a decision has been made by the Forum

Option A

Nominations for Chair and Vice Chair are received by the Clerk in advance of final meeting of the school year. Nominations, with pen portrait, must be submitted at least 7 days prior to the publication of Schools Forum papers. Names of the nominees, along with the pen portraits, would be emailed to Schools Forum members in preparation for the election (if required) at the meeting. Where no nominations are received prior to the meeting, nominations will be sought at the meeting. This will take place only every two years unless either post becomes vacant (see 4.21).

Option B

Nominations for Chair and Vice Chair are received under the agenda item at the final meeting of the school year (usually July) .This will take place only every two years unless either post becomes vacant (see 4.21). The election (if required) would take place as part of that agenda item.

- 4.17 In the event that there is only one (1) candidate for each position, it will not be necessary for members to vote, and those candidates will be appointed to the positions.
- 4.18 If for any reason it is not possible to reach a decision regarding the persons to be appointed to the positions of Chair or Vice Chair, the matter will be considered at the next meeting of the Forum.
- 4.19 The Clerk to the Forum must act as Chair during the part of the meeting at which appointments to the posts of Chair or Vice Chair are considered.
- 4.20 All candidates must comply with the paragraphs in this document on Conflicts of Interests and leave the meeting at which their suitability for either of these positions is to be discussed.

- 4.21 The Chair and Vice Chair may resign from their posts at any time by giving written notice to the Clerk and can be removed from the post with immediate effect in the event that a resolution to remove the Chair or Vice Chair has been passed at two consecutive meetings which have been convened in accordance with the following rules:
 - (a) seven (7) clear days' notice of each meeting is given;
 - (b) removing the Chair or Vice Chair is a specific item on the agenda for both meetings;
 - (c) there are at least fourteen (14) days between the two meetings;
 - (d) there are at least two-thirds of the members (rounded up to a whole number) at both meetings, and before the vote at the second meeting, the member proposing the removal of the Chair or Vice Chair states reasons for the proposal, and the Chair or Vice Chair is given an opportunity to make a statement in reply.

Acting Chair:

4.22 If the Chair is unable to attend any meeting, or if the post is vacant, the Forum members will elect one of those members present to Chair that meeting only, normally being the Vice-Chair.

Clerk:

- 4.23 The Clerk to the Forum will be appointed by the appropriate Director responsible for education and children's services and will convene, direct, offer advice on procedure and minute meetings in accordance with directions given by the Forum.
- 4.24 The Clerk will not have either a vote or a casting vote when in the position of acting Chair in accordance with paragraph 4.18.

Administration

- 4.25 Every member of the Forum will be given at least seven (7) days' written notice of the date of a meeting with a copy of the agenda for that meeting. This is to enable members to consider the papers and if necessary obtain views from the group they are representing. The notice and agenda will be sent out by the Clerk to the Forum. A copy of the paperwork will be sent to the Director responsible for education and children's services at the same time as to members of the Forum. Shorter notice can only be given if the Chair (or the vice-Chair if the Chair is absent or the position has not been filled) agrees that there is an urgent need for a meeting. Members can be contacted/consulted by email on matters of urgency. Meetings to consider the removal of the Chair or a co-opted governor must be convened with at least seven (7) clear days' notice. Papers are published on the Council's website to enable representations to be made to Forum members and to ensure that all interested groups are able to access the papers prior to a meeting.
- 4.26 The agenda will be agreed by the Chair of the Forum. The Forum will whenever necessary consider and revise an annual work programme for meetings.

- 4.27 Minutes of each Forum meeting must be taken by the person acting as Clerk. A copy of the draft minutes will be circulated to members within two (2) weeks of the meeting or as soon as possible thereafter, prior to their formal approval at the next meeting,
- 4.28 The Clerk must make sure that copies of the agenda, draft and approved minutes and any report, document or other paper considered at a meeting (not including confidential items) are made available at County Buildings for anyone to read. Agendas, reports and minutes should also be promptly posted on the Forum's website.

Confidentiality

- 4.29 The following information which may be presented, discussed and voted upon at any meetings of the Forum, must be kept confidential:
 - (a) the votes of individual members;
 - (b) opinions by members involving a named person which are in any way sensitive or critical;
 - (c) anything else which the Forum decides ought to be considered as such.
- 4.30 Confidential information will be recorded separately by the Clerk and will not be available for inspection by the general public.

Conflicts of Interest

- 4.31 In common with other aspects of working in public life, Forum members should, for reasons of probity, be aware of circumstances in which they should withdraw from meetings. The general principle is that no-one should be involved in a decision where his or her personal interests may conflict with those of the Forum.
- 4.32 Forum members should declare any personal interest as soon as a matter in which they have an interest is raised and withdraw from that meeting. However, Forum members need not withdraw because of an interest that is no greater than that of other members of the Forum, e.g. primary school nominees should not withdraw from discussions on primary school funding.

Proceedings

- 4.33 The proceedings of the Forum shall not be invalidated by:
 - (a) any vacancy among their members;
 - (b) any defect in the election or appointment of any members; or
 - (c) any defect in the appointment of the Chair.

5 FUNCTIONS

Consultation with the Schools Forum on the school funding formula

- 5.1 The Council will consult the Forum on:-
 - (a) any proposed changes in relation to the factors and criteria that were taken into account, or the methods, principles and rules that have been adopted, in their formula made in accordance with regulations made under section 47 of the School Standards and Framework Act 1998, and
 - (b) the financial effect of any such change.
- 5.2 Consultation under paragraph 5.1 will take place in sufficient time to allow the views expressed to be taken into account in the determination of the relevant authority's formula and in the initial determination of schools' budget shares before the beginning of the financial year.

Consultation on contracts

5.3 The Council will, at the meeting prior to the issue of invitations to tender (being at least one month prior to invitations to tender), consult the Forum on the terms of any proposed contract that is paid out or to be paid out of the schools budget for services or supplies to schools, where such a contract is to be let by the Council to a value equal to or exceeding the local government threshold which applies to that proposed contract pursuant to regulation 5 of the Public Contracts Regulations 2015.

Consultation on financial issues

- 5.4 The Council will consult the Forum annually in respect of functions relating to the schools budget, including:-
 - (a) the arrangements to be made for the education of pupils with special educational needs, and in particular:
 - (i) the places to be commissioned by the Council in different schools and other institutions, and
 - (ii) the arrangements for paying top-up funding to schools and other institutions;
 - (b) arrangements for the use of pupil referral units and the education of children otherwise than at school, and in particular:
 - (i) the places to be commissioned by the Council and by schools in pupil referral units and other providers of alternative provision, and
 - (ii) the arrangements for paying top-up funding to pupil referral units and other providers of alternative provision;
 - (c) arrangements for insurance;
 - (d) prospective revisions to the scheme for the financing of schools;
 - (e) administrative arrangements for the allocation of central government grants paid to schools via the Council;
 - (f) arrangements for free school meals; and
 - (g) arrangements for early years provision.

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5.5 The Council will consult the Forum on such other matters concerning the funding of schools as it sees fit and as required by government regulations.

Reports by the Forum

5.6 The Forum will, as soon as reasonably possible and in any event by any date specified by the Council, provide the Council with a report in writing in response to any consultation under this section 5.

Other functions

5.7 The Forum may commission and publish reports and research into school funding issues. The Forum may also commission or liaise with working groups on issues related to the function of the Forum.

Provision of account to schools

- 5.8 The Forum will, as soon as reasonably possible, inform the governing bodies of maintained schools of:
 - (a) all consultations carried out under this section 5, and
 - (b) any reports provided by the Forum under paragraph 5.7 above.

Consultation

- 5.9 It is a responsibility of the Council to ensure there is consultation with all schools on the following issues:
 - (a) changes to the School Funding Formula;
 - (b) changes to the Scheme for Financing Schools.

6 **EXPENSES**

Forum's Expenses

- 6.1 All expenses of the Forum will be met by the Council and charged to the schools budget.
- 6.2 The Annual Outturn Report will include as part of the overall figure:
 - (a) the costs of servicing the Forum which have been charged to the schools budget for the preceding financial year;
 - (b) the costs of additional work commissioned by the Forum which has been charged to the schools' budget for the preceding financial year.

Members' Expenses

6.3 The Council will reimburse the reasonable travel costs of members for attendance at the Forum's meetings, following receipt of a valid claim, at its current mileage rate for attendance at in-service training activities. Such expenses will be charged to the schools budget.

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Staffordshire County Council's Schools Forum Membership

- 1. The Forum will normally have a maximum of thirty two (32) members (subject to paragraph 3.1 of the Constitution):
 - (a) twenty three (23) schools members; and
 - (b) nine (9) non-schools members.
- 2. Maintained primary, maintained secondary and academies must be broadly proportionately represented on the Forum, having regard to the total number of pupils registered at them. The Council can determine the number of members representing schools in each of the categories set out below. These should be broadly comparable to the pupil numbers in each of these categories.

The Forum's members will include the following:

- (a) <u>School Members:</u>
 - places for maintained primary schools representatives, where there are any maintained primary schools in Staffordshire, who are either a governor, headteacher or senior member of staff;
 - places for maintained secondary schools representatives, where there are any maintained secondary schools in Staffordshire, who are either a governor, headteacher or senior member of staff;
 - places for primary and secondary academy representatives, elected from the proprietor bodies of academies within the Council's area;
 - one (1) place for a special academy representative, elected from the proprietor bodies of academies within the Council's area;
 - one (1) place for a maintained special school representative, where there are any maintained special schools in Staffordshire, who are either a governor, headteacher or senior member of staff;
 - one (1) place for a primary schools representative, elected from its membership by the Council's primary schools headteacher forum;
 - one (1) place for a secondary schools representative, elected from its membership by the Council's secondary schools headteacher forum;
 - one (1) place for a middle schools representative, elected from its membership by the Council's middle schools headteacher forum;

- one (1) place for a nursery school representative, who is either a governor, headteacher or a senior member of staff;
- one (1) place for a maintained pupil referral unit representative, where there are any maintained pupil referral units in Staffordshire, who is either a governor, headteacher or a senior member of staff;
- one (1) place for an academy pupil referral unit representative, elected from the proprietor bodies of academy pupil referral units within the Council's area.

Notes:

- 1. Where at least one (1) maintained school exists in any category, at least one schools member must be a representative of that category.
- 2. A "senior member of staff" means an executive headteacher, principal, deputy headteacher, assistant headteacher, business manager or other person responsible for the financial management of the school.
- 3. Governors include interim executive members of an interim executive board.
- 4. Where they exist at least one member must be a representative of the governing bodies of maintained schools and at least one member must be a representative of the headteachers of such schools.
- 5. Proprietor in relation to an academy means the person or body of persons responsible for the management of the academy.
- 6. Middle schools are 'deemed secondary' and are included in the secondary category.
- (b) Non-school Members:
 - one (1) place for a member nominated by the Lichfield Diocesan Board of Education;
 - one (1) place for a member nominated by the Birmingham Diocesan Schools Commission;
 - one (1) place for a parent governor representative nominated by the Council's Prosperous Staffordshire Select Committee;
 - two (2) places for representatives of the early years PVI sector nominated by the early years sector;
 - two (2) places for members nominated by the 16-19 education sector; and
 - two (2) places for representatives of the schools consultative groups nominated by the branch secretaries.

The number of places will be published and updated on the Schools Forum website.

Membership Selection, Nomination and Appointment Timetable

The school membership will be reviewed at the beginning of each term (2nd week in September, January and April) to confirm the proportions of maintained and academy school representatives are broadly comparable to the pupil numbers in each of these categories (see Appendix C). Where a vacancy occurs due to paragraphs 3.7 or 3.8 of the Constitution, the Clerk to Schools Forum will notify Entrust to undertake the selection process set out below.

- Once a vacancy arises the Clerk to Schools Forum will notify Entrust to seek applications for school members via a notice to head teachers and chairs of governing bodies requesting that the matter be raised with staff and governing bodies within 4 school working weeks.
- Applications and nominations to be received within a further 4 school working weeks. In those groups where there is more than 1 application an election will be carried out, administered by Entrust on behalf of the Council.
- Membership of nominees to be confirmed by no later than a further 2 school working weeks.
- Where one application per position is received membership will be confirmed by no later than 2 school working weeks.
- Nominations for non-schools members will be sought from the relevant bodies within 1 calendar month of the vacancy occurring.

All members are appointed and attend their first meeting as soon as possible.

Termly Review of Membership

The Schools Forum school membership will be reviewed at the beginning of each term to confirm the proportions of maintained and academy school representatives are broadly comparable to the pupil numbers in each of these categories. This is completed using the process below.

The total number of Schools Forum maintained schools and academy members is 23

The Schools Forum regulations state that, where there are any, there must be one member for each of the following: maintained nursery schools, maintained special schools, maintained PRUs, special academies and alternative provision academies. This is the case in Staffordshire. Therefore there are **5 members** from these schools and academies (1 from each type - 5 members).

This means that **18 Schools Forum school members** represent the mainstream primary and secondary schools and academies.

(Regardless of pupil numbers, where there are any in that group, there has to be at least one (1) schools member representative for maintained primary schools and maintained secondary schools.)

Using the latest school census information (example in the table below)

The number of primary and secondary representative is calculated using the percentages in the final column

Number of primary members is 53% of 18 = 9.6 Rounded to the nearest whole number, **10 primary members** are required

Number of secondary members is 47% of 18 = 8.4 Rounded to the nearest whole number, **8 secondary members** are required

Staffordshire Schools Forum has members nominated from the primary, middle and secondary headteacher forums (1 from each - **3 members**).

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To calculate the proportion of maintained and academy representatives for each phase the same process is completed

Number of maintained primary members is 43% of 9 = 3.9Rounded to the nearest whole number, **4 primary maintained members**

Number of academy primary members is 57% of 9 = 5.1Rounded to the nearest whole number, **5 primary academy members**

Number of maintained secondary members is 18% of 6 = 1.1 Rounded to the nearest whole number, **1 secondary maintained member**

Number of academy secondary members is 82% of 6 = 4.9 Rounded to the nearest whole number, **5 secondary academy members**

Based on the calculations above there would be

10 primary Schools Forum members of which:

- 1 primary school headteacher forum nomination
- 4 primary maintained school representatives
- 5 primary academy representatives

8 secondary Schools Forum members of which:

- 1 middle school headteacher forum nomination
- 1 secondary school headteacher forum nomination
- 1 secondary maintained school representative
- 5 secondary academy representatives

High Needs Block update

Executive Summary:

- The forecast outturn for the 2020/21 High Needs Block is £6.5m overspend. This is c £1m higher than the position last reported.
- The transformation and implementation of the revised SEND operating model, supported by the new SEND strategy, is expected to provide a more sustainable model.
- At the end of the current financial year the DSG reserve will be in deficit. A 'deficit recovery' plan earmarking surplus Growth Fund money to contribute to the DSG reserve will be reviewed annually.
- For Staffordshire the High Needs Block budget for 2021/22 has now been finalised for a total of £101.0m; an increase of £11.6m compared with 2020/21 (13%). None of this funding increase will be used to repay historical deficits.
- The Council recognises the financial pressures schools across Staffordshire are facing and will increase funding next year for all state funded special schools, on a like for like basis, by a minimum of 1.0%.
- Staffordshire will be providing a response to the DfE consultation about the proposals for a small number of changes to the national funding formula that is used to allocate high needs funding to local authorities in the 2022-23 financial year.

Recommendations:

That Schools Forum:

- 1. Notes the updates to the High Needs Block following the report previously presented in January 2021.
- 2. Notes the proposed High Needs Block budget 2021/22

Report of Deputy Chief Executive and Director for Families and Communities

<u>PART A</u>

Reasons for recommendations:

- 3. Due to the considerable and on-going pressure in this area, Schools forum requested regular updates on the latest position of the High Needs Block.
 - High Needs Block Forecast Outturn 2020/21
- 4. The forecast outturn for the 2020/21 High Needs Block is £6.5m overspend. This is c £1m higher than the position last reported mainly for Independent Special School provision and reflects the additional costs impacting on the HNB as a result of the EHCP backlog which has now been addressed. The overspend is largely a result of:

- An overspend of c £2.1m in Mainstream Schools as a result of increased demand
- An overspend of c £3.1m in our Special Schools as a result of increased demand and a rise in the proportion of children with higher needs and therefore costs
- An overspend of c £2.9m in Independent Schools as a result of increased demand.
- Other underspends of c £1.6m, mainly in the Locality Hub budget due to the delayed roll out of the district model in some areas
- 5. As a result, at the end of the current financial year the DSG reserve will be in deficit. The Schools Forum, at the October meeting, approved a 'deficit recovery' plan earmarking surplus Growth Fund money to contribute to the DSG reserve. This will be reviewed annually, alongside the impact of the wider SEND transformation programme, to consider whether any further action is required.
 - High Needs Block budget 2021/22
- 6. At the Spending review the government reaffirmed their commitment to increase the schools' budget by £7.1 billion by 2022-23, compared to 2019-20 funding levels. This includes an uplift of £2.2 billion from 2020-21 to 2021-22 made up of:
 - £1.43bn (65%) for Schools
 - £0.73bn (33%) for High Needs
 - £0.04bn (2%) for Early Years
- 7. For 2021/22 the Government has confirmed an increase in the overall High Needs Block nationally of £730m. This following many years of government underfunding that has led to a severe crisis in this area nationally, where funding levels have failed to keep pace with costs and demand.
- 8. For Staffordshire the High Needs budget 2021/22 has now been finalised for a total of £101.0m; an increase of £11.6m compared with 2020/21 (13%). This increase will be passed on in full next year for the provision of SEND support; none of this funding rise will be used to repay historical deficits.
- 9. The Council recognises the financial pressures schools across Staffordshire are facing and will increase funding to providers by as much as is affordable and fair, acknowledging the current pressures on the HNB and the depleted DSG balances.
- 10. For 2021-22 Special School budgets will be set based on:
 - i. a Minimum Funding Guarantee of 1.0% (higher than the MFG set by Government of 0%); ensuring that funding for all Special Schools, on a like for like basis, will increase next year by a minimum of 1.0%.
 - ii. there will be no capping of school gains


PART B

Background

- 11. The financial risk of the High Needs Block has been a standing agenda at Schools Forum. The increase in demand on the High Needs Block has mainly arisen from a significant increase in a range of areas. These include:
 - Additional needs requests
 - Increase in pupil numbers requiring EHCPs,
 - Extension of age group to 25 for those with EHCPs,
 - Increase in out of county placements and costs,
 - Increase in Matrix funding for special schools,
 - Numbers of permanent exclusions from mainstream schools,
 - The funding of increased numbers of pupils out of education.
- 12. Despite additional Government funding this year, as previously stated this is insufficient to close the funding gap and there remains an overspend of c £6.5m in 2020/21. The main areas of forecast overspend within the High Needs Block are outlined below and summarised in the following table. A more detailed overview of the High Needs Block budget is provided within Appendix A:


13. This is c £1m higher than the forecast last presented and reflects continued growing demand within the Independent provision. This is likely the impact of the backlog in EHCP assessments where the cost of new placements continue to filter through the system.



Note: the High Needs Block does not include the following costs:
 <u>SEND home to school/college transport</u>; this is funded from the Council's general fund resources. The budget in 2020/21 is £11.9m and the latest forecast is that this budget will overspend by up to £3.3m in 2020/2021. The main issues driving up the cost of this budget are the increase in demand, the placement of children and young people in independent out of county special schools, an increase in the average cost per pupil which includes both transport and escort costs and an increase in single occupancy journeys.

- <u>prudential borrowing</u>; a further amount of £0.924m is funded from the Central Block for historical but on going debt charges as a result of borrowing previously taken out to finance historical capital investment in our Special Schools.
- High Needs Block Budget 2021/22
- 14. For 2021/22 the Government has confirmed an increase in the overall High Needs Block nationally of £730m. This following many years of government underfunding that has led to a severe crisis in this area nationally, where funding levels have failed to keep pace with costs and demand.
- 15. For Staffordshire the High Needs budget 2021/22 has now been finalised for a total of £101.0m; an increase of £11.6m compared with 2020/21 (13%).¹

¹ Part of this increase includes the 'roll in' of Teachers Pay Grant and Teachers Pension Grant equivalent to £2.2m which up to now has been paid as a separate grant but going forward will be received as part of the High Needs Block. On a like for like basis, the actual increase is £9.4m (11%).



- 16. Staffordshire, along with other councils across the sector, have been lobbying for additional resource and it is a positive sign that the Government has in the last two years provided for significant additional investment in this area. Whilst this is appreciated, it will not close the gap completely and we will continue to canvas for additional resource.
- 17. As in previous years, the schools block will be ring-fenced in 2021-22, with the option to transfer 0.5% of the Schools Block funding into the central school services, high needs or early years budgets, subject to the approval of Schools Forum. Given the increase in government funding next year, and that Schools Forum agreed in October 2020 a deficit recovery plan utilising surplus growth fund money, for 2021-22 no request has been made to transfer 0.5% from the Schools Block to the High Needs Block.
- 18. In 2021/22 the HNB budget is £101.0m; a net increase of nearly £12m compared to current funding levels. This increase will be passed on in full next year for the provision of SEND support; none of this funding rise will be used to repay historical deficits. The following summarises the proposed budget allocations for 2021/22 (see Appendix A for a more detailed analysis):



- 19. The Council recognises the financial pressures schools across Staffordshire are facing and, given the increase in Government funding, will increase funding to providers by as much as is affordable and fair, acknowledging the current pressures on the HNB and the depleted DSG balances. For 2021-22 Special School budgets will be set based on:
 - i. a Minimum Funding Guarantee of 1.0% (higher than the MFG set by Government of 0%); ensuring that funding for all Special Schools, on a like for like basis, will increase next year by a minimum of 1.0%.
 - ii. there will be no capping of school gains
- 20. Growing demand within the Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) system represents one of the Council's key service and financial risks. A further overspend on the High Needs Block is projected in 2020-21 of around £6.5m and will mean DSG balances will go into deficit at the end of the current financial year.
- 21. It is anticipated that through the transformation and implementation of the revised SEND Operating Model, supported by the new SEND strategy, will provide a more sustainable model, further improve relationships with district and school partners, and deliver improved educational and life outcomes for children and young people.
- 22. To support that programme, c £2m has been set aside within the HNB to ensure District Hubs have sufficient funds and are able to provide the necessary early intervention required.
- 23. The SEND and inclusion District model is continuing to develop with the setting up of Locality Management Groups and Partnership Boards. Such forums will provide a strategic opportunity to establish a more bespoke provision map in order to meet the needs in the locality. Appropriate SCC officers are working to confirm financial and commissioning procedures. There have been 'transition' arrangements moving from funding connected to the District Inclusion Panels moving into the SEND and Inclusion district model.

Other Updates

- High Needs Block Workshop
- 24. On 9 February 2021 the High Needs Block Workshop, involving members of the schools forum, convened for the second time to consider further the key issues impacting on the High Needs Block. The focus of the session was on:
 - i. Establishing a national context of HNB funding and how Staffordshire compares against other authorities (see Appendix B)
 - ii. Modelling HNB spend and demand going forward
- 25. It was agreed that at the next meeting, there will be a review of any nonstatutory funding as well as the needs of those children and young people being placed in the independent, non-maintained sector.
 - Education Banding Toolkit

- 26. The formal launch of EBT took place on the 25th February with 183 providers and LA Officers in virtual attendance. During the launch 39 questions were answered and the recording of the launch, slides and written copy of the questions and answers will be published on the Local Offer following engagement with parent/carers. Feedback from the launch event has been very positive (for more information see Education Banding Tool Launch | Staffordshire Connects)
- 27. The number of school and parent/carer representatives requesting to be part of this project has been overwhelming and currently totals 37 and therefore an Implementation Reference Group has been established. This group will meet regularly for us to share progress with and to provide advice and guidance to support the decision making of the Project Steering Group. Five representatives from the Implementation Reference Group from mainstream primary, secondary, special, FE and a parent/carer will also be asked to join the Project Steering Group. The first meeting of the Implementation Reference Group will be in March.



28. The high level implementation plan is shared below.

- <u>Review of the national funding formula for allocations of high needs funding to</u> <u>local authorities: changes for 2022-23</u>
- 29. On 10 February 2021 the DfE launched a <u>consultation</u> in response to specific proposals for a small number of changes to the national funding formula that is used to allocate high needs funding to local authorities in the 2022-23 financial year. The DfE are also seeking views on some of the longer term changes to the formula that could be considered in future.
- 30. In this consultation the DfE are asking for views specifically about the way that high needs funding is allocated through the national funding formula, rather than about the overall level of funding. Future consultations will cover further proposals

for changes to the formula and to the arrangements for the funding for SEND and AP.

- 31. The consultation focuses on the following:
 - a. how historic levels of local authority expenditure are used within the funding formula
 - b. attainment data used in the funding formula
 - c. effective proxies for SEND and AP in the formula
- 32. Questions about the expectation that mainstream schools meet the costs up to £6,000 of supporting a pupil with SEND from their core budget, the level of the £10,000 per place funding for special schools and the funding arrangements for young people with SEND in further education will be addressed as part of the DfE SEND review and in subsequent consultations.



Schools Budget 2021-22

Executive Summary

Schools

- The growth fund budget has been set at £2m. Any underspend will be transferred into the DSG reserve as per the deficit recovery plan.
- The final education functions levy has been set at £55.71 per pupil
- School budgets have been set using the National Funding Formula (NFF)
- The NFF has been funded in full with the maximum permissible MFG of 2% and no capping of gains.

Early Years

- Early Years funding rates have been set at £4.10 per hour for 3 & 4 year olds and £5.26 per hour for 2 year olds
- An Early Years contingency has been set at 0.7% of the Early Years Block funding
- Any underspend on Early Years contingency will be returned to providers as a one-off payment in the following financial year.

High needs

- Additional Government funding of £11.6m in 2021/22
- Special School budget have been set to provide for a Minimum Funding Guarantee of 1% and no capping of gains
- No request has been made for a funding switch of up to 0.5% from the Schools Block into the High Needs Block in 2021/22

Recommendation

Report of the County Treasurer

Central Provisions

- 2. The Schools Forum considered the indicative level of planned central expenditure for 202-22 at its October meeting, giving approval to the budget provision for a range of areas, to enable the local authority to meet the DfE timescale of submitting individual school budgets to ESFA in mid-January. This section of this report updates the Schools Forum with the final figures used within that approval.
- 3. There are four categories of centrally retained budgets within the Schools Budget:

- De-delegated items
- Central School Services Block (CSSB)
- Central Schools Expenditure
- Education Functions (previously funded by the Education Services Grant)
- 4. De-delegated items are those which have been retained centrally to be managed by the local authority on behalf of its maintained schools following the vote of the Schools Forum. These amounts are transferred from the local authority to academies through the ESFA and academies meet the related costs directly. In its annual vote on 15 October the Schools Forum voted to de-delegate for the same services in 2021-22 as in 2020-21. Therefore, this funding will continue to be held centrally to meet these costs on behalf of maintained schools. Insurance provision will now be provided through the DfE's Risk Protection Agreement. Funding for this service will be transferred from SCC to the DfE.
- 5. Expenditure within the Central School Service Block (CSSB) was also considered at the October 2020 Schools Forum meeting. Members agreed that funding allocated within this block should be retained centrally for the purposes outlined in the report. This block includes funding for Historic Commitments. With further reductions in this funding anticipated, in order to protect against a reduction in total DSG funding for Staffordshire, the remaining Early Help budget has been delegated to schools. The funding retained for Historic Commitments for 2021-22 is shown below:

- 6. Central Schools Expenditure areas include funding for infant class size and growth funding. Growth funding is allocated to the local authority on a formula basis. The allocation for 2021-22 is £3.1m. This funding has been used to ensure the NFF is funded in full. The remaining funding is held centrally to meet commitments under the infant class size and exceptional growth fund policies. The amount retained centrally is £2m. Any underspend will be transferred to the DSG reserve as per the deficit recovery plan reported to Forum in October 2020.
- 7. At the October meeting, maintained schools approved a levy per pupil for Education Functions of £55.68. Due to a slight change in the number on roll at maintained schools, the final levy for 2021-22 has been set at £55.71 per pupil.

Individual School Budgets

8. This element of the schools' budget represents by far the largest part of the funding for the majority of schools. Formula Budgets are now based on the National Funding

Formula (NFF) as approved by Schools Forum in December 2017 and Cabinet in January 2018.

- 9. The NFF includes a minimum per pupil funding level. For 2021-22 the minimum funding levels per pupil are £4,180 for primary, £5,215 for Key Stage 3 and £5,715 for Key Stage 4.
- 10. The budget also includes a Minimum Funding Guarantee (MFG) of +2% per pupil from the 2020-21 baseline. This ensures schools are protected from excessive year on year changes due to changes in their pupil characteristics.
- 11. Teachers pay and pension grants have been rolled into the NFF. Basic per pupil funding rates have been increased by 9% to reflect this. The maximum amount of funding for primary sparsity has also been increased from £26,000 to £45,000.
- 12. All schools have been funded in full on the NFF. Gains have not been capped. A summary of School Budgets for 2021-22 with a comparison to 2020-21 budgets has been included in Appendix 1. Sixth form funding has been excluded.

Early Years Funding

- 13. The funding for Early Years continues to follow the national Early Years Funding Formula.
- 14. The Early Years budget consists of the following areas of expenditure:
 - Pupils in Private, Voluntary and Independent (PVI) providers
 - Pupils in Nursery schools
 - 2 year olds
 - Central expenditure
- 15. The early years national funding formula allocates funding to local authorities for the existing 15-hour entitlement for all 3 & 4 year olds and the additional 15 hours for 3 & 4 year old children of eligible working parents. The rate consists of a base rate and an uplift for additional needs, based on measures of free school meals; Disability Living Allowance and English as an additional language.
- 16. For 2021-22 Staffordshire County Council has been awarded the minimum national funding rate of £4.44 per hour for 3 & 4 year olds and £5.36 per hour for 2 year olds, this is a 6p and 8p rise respectively from 2020-21.
- 17. The Disability Access Fund (DAF) continues at a rate equivalent to £615 per child per year to support access to the free entitlements. This Fund will be for 3 & 4 year olds who are taking up their free entitlement and are in receipt of Disability Living Allowance. The Early Years Pupil Premium (EYPP) continues.
- 18. Local authorities are required to pass at least 95% of early years funding to providers. The early years funding central expenditure was approved by School Forum on 15 October 2020, leaving 95.7% of 3 and 4 year old funding being provided directly to providers.

- 19. Two Early Year workshops took place with the sector on the 30th January 2020. The groups discussed how the Early Year funding had worked since the introduction of the National Funding Formula and the 30 hours funding in 2017-18; with a focus on rate setting for the financial year 2020-21 and determining a level of funding that would be sufficient for deprivation and contingency budgets.
- 20. The groups felt that a budget for contingency was necessary to mitigate against demand led pressures. However, as the contingency is effectively created from a top slice of the rate we pay to the sector, the groups considered that if the Early Years block underspent that any unspent contingency allocation should be passed on to the sector as a one off payment in the following year. This has now been agreed as a SCC policy going forward.
- 21. Following the group discussions, it was determined that 1% of the overall Early Years Block would be sufficient as a contingency budget and 2% of the 3 & 4 year old funding should be used for deprivation.
- 22. The 2021-22 funding increase has been passed straight into the base rate. The rate for 3 & 4 year olds has been set at £4.10 per hour per child and this rate will also apply for 30 hour entitlements. This represents an increase of 6p (1.5%) per hour per child. The rate for 2 year olds has been set at £5.26 per hour per child. This represents an increase of 8p (1.5%) per hour per child.
- 23. The deprivation supplement allocates approximately 2% for deprivation. The rates for deprivation have been set at:
 - a. An additional £0.22 (per hour/per child for every funded 3 and 4 year old in attendance) if between 10-32% of funded children reside in areas of deprivation measured by the IDACI (Income Deprivation Affecting Children Index) Government metric.
 - b. An additional £0.33 (per hour/per child for every funded 3 and 4 year old in attendance) if between 33-100% of funded children reside in areas of deprivation measured by the IDACI (Income Deprivation Affecting Children Index) Government metric.
- 24. A contingency fund has also been set up to manage fluctuations in demand figures from year to year of 0.7% for 3 and 4 year olds and 1.9% for 2 year olds. This is equivalent of 0.75% of the whole Early Years DSG Block, which is lower than the 1% threshold advised by the workshops.

- 32. Special Schools continue to be funded on a place plus top-up basis, the value of which is £10,000 in line with Government guidelines. Staffordshire County Council has commissioned 2,571 places at Staffordshire Special Schools, of which 2,029 places are at academies (at the time of writing the report).
- 33. Pupil Referral Units (PRUs) continue to be funded as school-like entities on a place plus top-up basis. For 2021/22 Staffordshire County Council has commissioned 359 places at Staffordshire PRUs at a value of £10,000 per place in line with Government guidance.

Funding next year will also include adjustments for:

- a. To ensure PRUs see a comparable 1% rise next year, local authority funded top up payments (TRIG-8) for single rolled pupil will be increased from £7,300 to £7,450; however charges for school commissioned preventative places will remain unchanged.
- b. A further 'lump sum' contribution will be made of £0.118m for fixed overheads in line with other school funding arrangements (up from £0.114m in 2020/21).
- c. One pupil referral unit provides hospital-based tuition (the Darwin Centre) and receives a set payment to reflect these costs. The total budget allocation for hospital-based tuition at this PRU setting is £0.190m, an uplift of 1% compared to 2020/21 in line with other school funding rises.
- 34. Provision will continue to be made for Post-16 high needs colleges and independent providers in line with latest forecasts (c £4.4m). In addition to this, the Council has commissioned 410 places FE colleges for the academic year 2021/22.
- 35. Staffordshire currently has one primary school (Victoria Community School) which has a speech and language centre attached and it receives a devolved budget to manage the costs. The funding is based on an agreed number of places at £10,000 per place. The number of places for 2021/22 at this school is 20.
