Kelly Mitchell had informed the Chair that she would be taking a 12 month career break and asked if a named substitute (Kate Cooke) could represent her while she was away.

NOTED:

- (a) The apologies and reasons for absence were formally accepted.
- (b) That Kate Cooke be agreed as the name substitute for Kelly Mitchell, representing Maintained Primaries.

56. Declarations of Interest

There were no declarations made at the meeting.

57. Minutes of the meeting held on 8 November 2021

RESOLVED: That the minutes of the meeting held on the 8 November 2021 be confirmed as a correct record and signed by the Chair.

The forum had the following discussion over items in the minutes:

- 1. Minute 45 Membership Mr Shaw had resigned, and the recruitment process was being followed.
- 2. Minute 47 -update Consultation on the abolition of the Schools Improvement Grant had been published and this would proceed with withdrawing the grant on a phased basis, Year 1. 50% Year 2. 100%. The Governments revised guidance would be published soon and this would explain the LA role. This would be considered along with what this meant for Schools Forum and maintained schools which remained, this would come back to a forum meeting in October if de-delegation was requested.
- 3. Minute 52 Early Years Funding and the scheduled meeting with officers and providers later in the month. It was confirmed that the group would receive data on deprivation supplements and any other supplements and underspend to consider at the meeting and the group would discuss the cost increases within the sector.
- 4. Minute 53 High Needs Block Had the Local Authority (LA) appealed and if so, what was the timescales for the decision? In response Tim Moss reported that the LA had appealed but no formal feedback had been received and more detail was in the HNB report later on the agenda.

58. Decisions taken by the Chairman under delegated powers

None taken by the Chair since the last meeting.

59. Notices of Concern and Licensed Deficit Agreements

It was reported that there had not been any new notices of concern or licensed deficits issued since the last meeting.

RESOLVED: That the report be noted.

60. Growth Fund - Submission of Financial Self Declaration

The report explained that in 2016/17, Schools Forum had introduced a requirement for schools who were eligible for growth funding to submit a financial self-declaration for the three previous financial years. This requirement had been suspended during the Covid pandemic to reduce schools administrative burdens.

It was explained that the information had not been used and proved an administrative burden on schools and was also inconsistent as maintained and academy budgets operated under different financial years and accounting rules.

The report recommended ending the requirement for schools to submit the financial information.

Representatives of the Schools Consultative Group felt that the decision should be suspended until 2023.

Upon being put to the vote, the Forum agreed to end the requirement for schools that are eligible for growth funding to submit a financial self-declaration from 2022/23.

RESOLVED: That the requirement for schools that are eligible for growth funding to submit a financial self-declaration, ends from the academic year 2022/23.

61. High Needs Block (inc Banding Tool update)

The Forum considered the regular report of the Deputy Chief Executive and Director for Families and Communities which forecast an overspend of £8.2m for the financial year 2021/22. This was due in part to the increase in number of EHCP's which had increased by 65% in the last five years and the use of the Independent sector.

It was reported that at the end of the last financial year the DSG reserve had gone into deficit by c£2m and it was expected that this would deepen given the expected overspend in 2021/22.

It was reported that this was a national concern, and the Local Authority would continue to lobby for extra funding. The Government had added an extra £325m to settlements for 2022/23 which would give Staffordshire an extra £4m. Despite this significant additional Government funding, increasing Staffordshire's High Needs Budget to £115m (c 14%), it was felt that this was insufficient to close the gap and it was likely that a further overspend would arise in 2022/23.

Officers informed the Forum that Government had written to the LA to ask if they wished to withdraw their request for additional funding given the £4m increased budget. It was intended that the request would stand and not be withdrawn.

Work to implement of the new Education Banding Tool (EBT) continued in line with the original implementation plan. However, to ensure the successful

implementation of the EBT, it had been agreed to delay the start date until April 2022.

With regard to the Prudential borrowing, it was estimated that the amount would continue to decline until 2037.

Following a question on what was being done to reduce demand for Independent sector placements, Members were informed that a SEND Contracts Manager had been appointed and it was their role to look at attendance reporting, holding the contracted independent providers to account and improve relations and efficiency in the system.

Home educated children was highlighted as an area of concern, particularly the ability for some parents to deliver a full curriculum. This would continue to be accessed.

The Forum was informed that following a recent Secondary Heads meeting it was felt by those present that there was a need for more alternative provision and funding into PRU's in order to keep children in mainstream schools. It was questioned why the PRU's were underspent and if they were accessible enough on a part time basis. Officers felt that there had been more investment in PRUs in recent years, with part time placements available across all PRU's. There were also 31 providers across Staffordshire who offered a wide range of alternative curriculum need/provision which are all detailed on the Local Offer. Part of the PRU underspend was due to Covid restricting movement.

It was suggested that the Lesley Calverley and Carolyn Knight, along with Kirsty Rogers (Maintained Pupil Referral Units) and the Chair, Richard Redgate (Academy Pupil Referral Units) be invited to the next meeting of the Secondary Head Teachers group to discuss the type of alternative provision that was available and or needed.

It was asked if there was any data which showed the net number of EHCPs and the predicted change as pupils got older and left education provision (0-25years). It was explained that the net number of EHCP's had increased by 400 per year but there were individuals who left the system but at various ages. This information was available if needed.

The Chair felt that there could be enough capacity in the Special schools to reduce the need for expensive independent sector placements, but in order to provide that, the children with less complex needs, needed to be better served in mainstream schools. The effectiveness of the Hubs needed to be evaluated to ensure improved outcomes could be achieved. A question on the comparison with the forecast spend for 2021/22 compared to 2020/21 and the allocation of funding to the various sectors was asked, the point being that mainstream schools needed to be funded appropriately if they are to support and keep children in that setting.

RESOLVED:

- a) The High Needs Block budget update 2021/22 and latest forecast outturn be noted.
- b) the update on the latest DSG government settlement be noted.
- c) the latest update on the development and roll out of a new Education Banding Tool be noted.
- d) Lesley Calverley; Carolyn Knight; Kirsty Rogers (Maintained Pupil Referral Units); and the Chair, Richard Redgate (Academy Pupil Referral Units) be invited to the next meeting of the Secondary Head Teachers group to discuss the type of alternative provision needed.

62. **Date of next meeting and Work Programme**

It was explained that meetings of the Forum had been arranged on the same day and at similar times of the year to provide consistency but that meeting could be held on other days if needed, subject to availability of rooms/Webcast support etc.

High Needs Block update

Executive Summary:

- The forecast outturn for the 2021/22 High Needs Block is £8.2m overspend (no change from the position last reported)
- At the end of the last financial year the DSG reserve went into deficit by c £2m and will deepen given the expected overspend in 2021/22. A 'deficit management plan' must now be brought forward.
- Significant additional Government funding next year will see Staffordshire's High Needs Budget increase to £114.8m; an increase of £13.7m compared with 2021/22 (c 13.6%). However this is insufficient to close the gap and it is likely that a further overspend will arise in 2022/23. None of this funding increase will be used to repay historical deficits.
- The Council recognises the financial pressures schools across Staffordshire are facing and will increase funding next year for all state funded special schools, on a like for like basis, by a minimum of 2.5%.
- Work to implement of the new Education Banding Tool continues in line with the original implementation plan and went live on 14 March 2022.

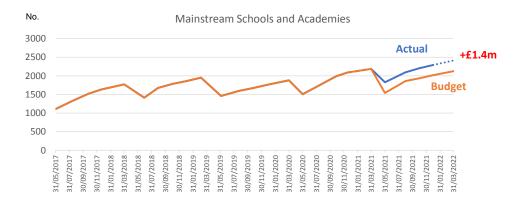
Background

- 4. The financial risk of the High Needs Block has been a standing agenda at Schools Forum. The increase in demand on the High Needs Block has been reported regularly. Pressures on the High Needs block are on going due to the continued increase in a range of areas. These include:
 - Additional needs requests
 - Increase in pupil numbers requiring EHCPs,
 - Extension of age group to 25 for those with EHCPs,
 - Increase in independent placements and costs,
 - Increase in Matrix funding for special schools,
 - The funding of increased numbers of pupils educated 'other than at school'.

- Budget 2021/22 and Forecast
- 5. Despite additional Government funding this year, as previously stated this is insufficient to close the funding gap and there remains a forecast overspend of c £8.2m in 2021/22 (no change from previous forecasts). The main areas of forecast overspend within the High Needs Block are outlined below and summarised in the following table. A more detailed overview of the High Needs Block budget is provided within Appendix A:

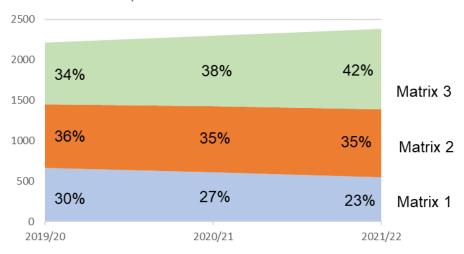

 - i) An overspend of c £3.1m against the school 'top up' budgets including:
 - a rise in the number of children with EHCP/AEN support in Mainstream Schools and Academies leading to a £1.4m overspend:

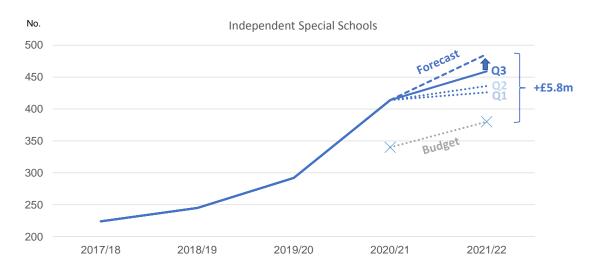


 An overspend of £2.4m in special schools and academies, arising as a result of both an increase in demand and a rise in the proportion of children with higher needs.

ii)An overspend of c £5.8m in Independent Special Schools



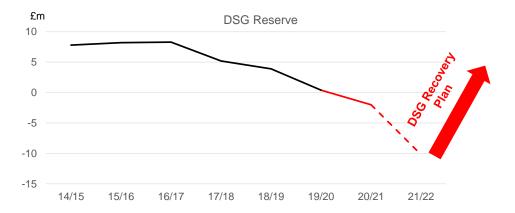
Note: the High Needs Block does not include the following costs:

- <u>SEND home to school/college transport</u>; this is funded from the Council's general fund resources. The budget in 2021/22 is £15.6m and the latest forecast is that this budget will overspend by £1.3m this year.

The main issues driving up the cost of this budget are the increase in demand, the placement of children and young people in independent out of county special schools, an increase in the average cost per pupil which includes both transport and escort costs (inc fuel price inflation) and an increase in single occupancy journeys.

- <u>prudential borrowing</u>; a further amount of £0.924m is funded from the Central Block for historical but on going debt charges as a result of borrowing previously taken out to finance historical capital investment in our Special Schools.

7. As a result of the on-going overspend in the HNB, over the last few years the DSG reserve has been fully depleted and at the end of last year went into deficit by c £2m. Given the latest forecast overspend 2021/22 that deficit is likely to increase this year to c £10m (before other transfers).



- High Needs Block Budget 2022/23
- 8. For 2022/23 the Government initially confirmed an increase in the overall High Needs Block of £780m; however, as part of the 2021 Autumn Spending Review further funding of £325m has been confirmed in recognition of the very significant service and cost pressures impacting in this area. This, following many years of government underfunding that has led to a severe crisis in this area nationally where funding levels have failed to keep pace with costs and demand.
- 9. For Staffordshire the HNB 2022/23 is c £114.8m, a net increase of £13.7m compared with 2021/22 (13.6%). Whilst this increase is warmly welcomed, it is insufficient to close the existing funding gap and Staffordshire will continue to lobby for both additional funding and a fair and equitable mechanism for addressing cumulative deficits that should not impact on the Council's already stretched general resources.
- 10. As in previous years, the schools block will be ring-fenced in 2022-23, with the option to transfer 0.5% of the Schools Block funding into the central school services, high needs or early years budgets, subject to the approval of Schools Forum. Given the pressures within the High Needs Block a request was made for a transfer of 0.5% in 2022-23 though this was rejected by Schools Forum at its meeting in November 2021.
- 11. It is Staffordshire's intention to pass on the full budget increase next year for the provision of SEND support; none of this funding rise will be used to repay historical deficits.
- 12. The Council recognises the financial pressures schools across Staffordshire are facing and, given the increase in Government funding, will increase funding to providers by as much as is affordable and fair, acknowledging the current pressures on the HNB and the depleted DSG balances which at the end of the current financial year will likely be in deficit by circa £8-10m.

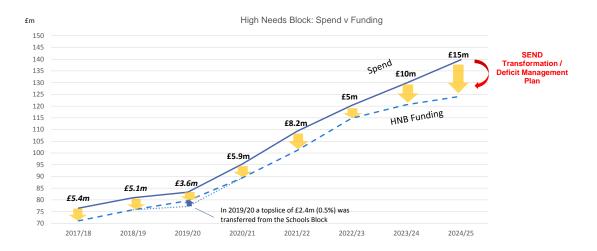
- 13. For 2022-23 Special School budgets will be set based on:
 - i. a Minimum Funding Guarantee of 2.5% (higher than the MFG set by Government of 0%); ensuring that funding for all Special Schools, on a like for like basis, will increase next year by a minimum of 2.5%.
 - ii. there will be no capping of school gains

A schedules of rates applicable for mainstream, special schools and PRUs in 2022/23 is available at Appendices B and C.

14. In 2022/23 the HNB budget is £114.8m; a net increase of c £13.7m compared to current funding levels. The following summarises the proposed budget allocations for 2022/23:

15. Even with the additional Government funding a further significant overspend is anticipated in 2022/23. Accordingly, and working in partnership with Schools Forum, the Council must now bring forward a 'DSG deficit management plan' outlining the actions that can be taken to address and mitigate the existing shortfall as far as possible. This will sit alongside the wider service transformation plan.



Other Updates

- <u>High Needs Block Workshop</u>
- 16. On 2 March the High Needs Block Workshop, involving members of the schools forum, convened to consider the current pressures in High Needs Block and the accumulated deficit / 'deficit management plan'. The focus of the session was on:
 - i. Staffordshire benchmarking
 - ii. Current breakdown of HNB and future forecast
 - iii. Transformation
 - iv. Deficit management plan
- 17. It was agreed that managing the HNB deficit is challenging and the DfE SEND review is required to support the challenges faced nationally. Locally the developments in SEND and Inclusion hubs is a medium to long term strategy. Further work is required to understand the impact of tribunal rulings, the designation of generic special schools, timeliness of transitions and phase transfers.
- 18. In order to manage the deficit we will continue to utilise surplus growth funding, continue to work with Schools forum to seek approval for the 0.5% transfer from the schools block to the high needs block, consider non statutory activity funded through the HNB, review the MFG policy for specialist and alternative provision as well as reviewing the funding allocated through the EBT.
 - Education Banding Toolkit
- 19. Progress on the implementation of the Imosphere's Education Banding Tool (EBT) has continued as planned. From 14th March 2022, the Local Authority went live with the tool across maintained, academy and independent mainstream providers and maintained and academy specialist providers to calculate the education element of the high needs top-up funding for Staffordshire children and young people with an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP).
- 20. From this date the EBT was applied to:
 - ALL draft EHCPs following an EHC needs assessment
 - ALL amended EHCPs where there was a significant change in need as identified through the annual review process.
- 21. The EBT supports fair, equitable and consistent funding mechanisms across education providers and localities. It is a needs led tool rather than a provision based one and it is not about reducing funding but about making it fair across the system.
- 22. The implementation for FE colleges and Post 16 Training Providers has been postponed due to the complexities of funding in this sector. We will not therefore implement until further investigation and funding models can be considered and a second consultation with Education Providers is undertaken.

- 23. The EBT consists of a series of questions, known as the Pupil Needs Profile (PNP), in relation to the needs of the child and young person and is completed by the SEND Keyworker. The PNP is shared with the Education Provider and the parent/carer through the EHC Hub portal.
- 24. The PNP covers 12 areas of need:
 - i. Communicating Well
 - ii. Achieving potential for learning
 - iii. Developing and enjoying recreation activities and community inclusion
 - iv. Forming positive relationships
 - v. Maintained emotional well-being
 - vi. Dealing successfully with change within an education setting
 - vii. Being independent with self-care
 - viii. Being independent with mobility and motor skills
 - ix. Managing behaviour
 - x. Risk of accidental or intentional harm when in an education setting
 - xi. Impact of sensory impairment and/or processing difficulty
 - xii. Preparing for Post-16 education and adulthood
- 25. Key staff within the local authority have completed mandatory training prior to implementation of the EBT. This consisted of eleven training videos, reading and understanding of the Assessor Guide and attending a workshop to ensure consistency of practice across the county. During the initial Go Live period dropin sessions have been provided to support staff undertaking this new role.
- 26. A monthly audit will be undertaken on a sample of completed PNPs by the district Family Practitioner Leads SEND/Education jointly with SEND Keyworkers. In addition, termly moderation will be in place as peer-to-peer support for the SEND Keyworkers and an annual standardisation, which will consist of a practical group exercise. The output of the audits, moderations and standardisation will be regularly collated and analysed to identify discrepancies and/or patterns to support the consistency of practice.
- 27. Finally, a review of the EBT, linked to the identified benefits at the start of the project implementation, is planned at the end of each term and then an annual review will be undertaken in partnership with Imosphere.

Schools Budget 2022-23

Executive Summary

Schools

- The growth fund budget has been set at £1.9m. Any underspend will be transferred into the DSG reserve as per the deficit recovery plan.
- The final education functions levy has been set at £50.84 per pupil
- School budgets have been set using the National Funding Formula (NFF)
- The NFF has been funded in full with the MFG set at 1% and no capping of gains.

Early Years

- Early Years funding base rates have been set at £4.26 per hour for 3 & 4
 year olds and £5.47 per hour for 2 year olds
- An Early Years contingency has been set at 0.8% of the Early Years Block funding
- Any underspend on Early Years contingency will be returned to providers as a one-off payment in the following financial year (subject to affordability).

High needs

- Additional Government funding of £13.7m in 2022/23
- Special School budget have been set to provide for a Minimum Funding Guarantee of 2.5% (and no capping of gains)
- A request was made for a funding switch of up to 0.5% from the Schools Block into the High Needs Block in 2022/23 but this was refused by Schools Forum.

Recommendation

1. That the Schools Forum notes the content of this report.

Report of the County Treasurer

Central Provisions

2. The Schools Forum considered the indicative level of planned central expenditure for 202-23 at its November meeting, giving approval to the budget provision for a range of areas, to enable the local authority to meet the DfE timescale of submitting individual school budgets to ESFA in mid-January. This section of this report updates the Schools Forum with the final figures used within that approval.

- 3. There are four categories of centrally retained budgets within the Schools Budget:
 - De-delegated items
 - Central School Services Block (CSSB)
 - Central Schools Expenditure
 - Education Functions (previously funded by the Education Services Grant)
- 4. De-delegated items are those which have been retained centrally to be managed by the local authority on behalf of its maintained schools following the vote of the Schools Forum. These amounts are transferred from the local authority to academies through the ESFA and academies meet the related costs directly. In its annual vote on 8 November the Schools Forum voted to de-delegate for the same services in 2022-23 as in 2021-22. Therefore, this funding will continue to be held centrally to meet these costs on behalf of maintained schools. Insurance provision continues to be provided through the DfE's Risk Protection Agreement. Funding for this service will be transferred from SCC to the DfE.
- 5. Expenditure within the Central School Service Block (CSSB) was also considered at the November 2021 Schools Forum meeting. Members agreed that ongoing funding allocated within this block should be retained centrally for the purposes outlined in the report. This block also includes funding for Historic Commitments. Funding previously held centrally for the Early Help service has been delegated to schools. The only funding retained centrally for Historic Commitments for 2022-23 is £924,130 for prudential borrowing.
- 6. Central Schools Expenditure areas include funding for infant class size and growth funding. Growth funding is allocated to the local authority on a formula basis. The allocation for 2022-23 is £3.5m. This funding has been used to ensure the NFF is funded in full. The remaining funding is held centrally to meet commitments under the infant class size and exceptional growth fund policies. The amount retained centrally is £1.9m. Any underspend will be transferred to the DSG reserve as per the deficit recovery plan.
- 7. At the November meeting, maintained schools approved a levy per pupil for Education Functions of £50.56. Due to a slight change in the number on roll at maintained schools, the final levy for 2022-23 has been set at £50.84 per pupil.

Individual School Budgets

- 8. This element of the schools' budget represents by far the largest part of the funding for the majority of schools. Formula Budgets are now based on the National Funding Formula (NFF) as approved by Schools Forum in December 2017 and Cabinet in January 2018.
- The NFF includes a minimum per pupil funding level. For 2022-23 the minimum funding levels per pupil are £4,265 for primary, £5,321 for Key Stage 3 and £5,831 for Key Stage 4.
- 10. The budget also includes a Minimum Funding Guarantee (MFG) of +1% per pupil from the 2021-22 baseline. This ensures schools are protected from excessive year on year changes due to changes in their pupil characteristics.

- 11. Within the NFF, the basic per pupil funding factor, additional needs factors and the school lump sum have been increased by 3%. The free school meals factor has increased by 2%.
- 12. The maximum amount of funding for sparsity has been increased from £45,000 to £55,000 for primaries and from £70,000 to £80,00 for middles and secondaries. Sparsity distances are now measured using road distances rather than straight line. A distance taper has also been added to the sparsity formula. These changes mean more schools in Staffordshire now qualify for sparsity funding. 44 schools have qualified for sparsity funding in 2022/23 compared to 23 schools in 2021/22.
- 13. All schools have been funded in full on the NFF. Gains have not been capped. A summary of School Budgets for 2022-23 with a comparison to 2021-22 budgets has been included in Appendix 1. Sixth form funding has been excluded.
- 14. Mainstream schools will receive a separate supplementary grant to provide support for the costs of the Health and Social Care Levy and wider costs. These payments will be made by the government in Spring 2022. Academies will receive the funding directly from the ESFA. Funding for maintained schools will be paid to the local authority who will be required to pass it to schools at the published rates, which are shown below:
 - Basic rate per pupil of £97 for primary pupils
 - Basic rate per pupil of £137 for key stage 3 pupils
 - Basic rate per pupil of £155 for key stage 4 pupils
 - Lump sum of £3,680
 - FSM6 per pupil rate of £85 per eligible primary pupil
 - FSM6 per pupil rate of £124 per eligible secondary pupil

Early Years Funding

- 15. The funding for Early Years continues to follow the national Early Years Funding Formula.
- 16. The Early Years budget consists of the following areas of expenditure:
 - Pupils in Private, Voluntary, and Independent (PVI) providers
 - Pupils in Nursery schools
 - 2 year olds
 - Central expenditure
- 17. The early years national funding formula allocates funding to local authorities for the existing 15-hour entitlement for all 3 & 4 year olds and the additional 15 hours for 3 & 4 year old children of eligible working parents. The rate consists of a base rate and an uplift for additional needs, based on measures of free school meals; Disability Living Allowance and English as an additional language.
- 18. For 2022-23 Staffordshire County Council has been awarded the minimum national funding rate of £4.61 per hour for 3 & 4 year olds and £5.57 per hour for 2 year olds, this is a 17p and 21p rise respectively from 2021-22.

- 19. The Disability Access Fund (DAF) has increased by £185, from £615 to £800 per eligible child per hour to support access to the free entitlements. This Fund will be for 3 & 4 year olds who are taking up their free entitlement and are in receipt of Disability Living Allowance. The Early Years Pupil Premium (EYPP) has increased by 7p, from 53p to 60 pence per eligible child per hour.
- 20. Local authorities are required to pass at least 95% of early years funding to providers. The early years funding central expenditure was approved by School Forum on 8 November 2021, leaving 95.8% of 3 and 4 year old funding being provided directly to providers.
- 21. In order to gain the views of the Early years sector on rate changes for 2022-23, to inform the decision making, a workshop was held on the 27th of January 2022 with the Early Years Reference Group, this is a group of Early Years Providers. This was at the request of the November 21 Schools Forum.
- 22. The following views were raised at the workshop:
 - Due to the financial pressures being faced by providers as much of the rise in the Government funded hourly rate as possible should be passed to the sector through an increase in the basic hourly rate.
 - Broad support for the continuation of existing policy to distribute c 2% of the budget based on deprivation.
 - Broad recognition and support for the continued 'topslice' for contingency to
 mitigate against in year unforeseeable variation. However, it was considered that
 this should be limited to 1% of the overall budget and if unspent should continue
 be redistributed to the sector as a one off sum in the following financial year
 (subject to affordability).
- 23. The base rate for 3 & 4 year olds has been set at £4.26 per hour per child and this rate will also apply for 30 hour entitlements. This represents an increase of 16p (i.e. 94% of the Government increase of 17p/hour) per hour per child. The rate for 2 year olds has been set at £5.47 per hour per child. This represents an increase of 21p (i.e. all of the Government rise) per hour per child.
- 24. Deprivation rates have been set at £0.20 (lower rate) and £0.30 (upper rate). These rates are lower than 21/22, however the actual amount of deprivation funding to be distributed has not changed and is estimated to be 1.9% of the overall 3 and 4 year old budget allocation.
- 25. A contingency fund has also been set up to manage fluctuations in demand figures from year to year of 0.7% for 3 and 4 year olds and 1.9% for 2 year olds. This is equivalent of 0.8% of the whole Early Years DSG Block, which is lower than the 1% threshold advised by the workshop.

High Needs Funding

26. The Schools Forum has a consultative role in the financial arrangements for pupils with Special Education Needs (SEN). The amount of funding that Staffordshire receives is determined by the high needs national funding formula (NFF).

- 27. For 2022/23 the Government initially confirmed an increase in the overall High Needs Block of £780m; however, as part of the 2021 Autumn Spending Review further funding of £325m has been confirmed in recognition of the very significant service and cost pressures impacting in this area. This, following many years of government underfunding that has led to a severe crisis in this area nationally where funding levels have failed to keep pace with costs and demand.
- 28. For Staffordshire the HNB 2022/23 is c £114.8m, a net increase of £13.7m compared with 2021/22 (13.6%). Whilst this increase is warmly welcomed, it is insufficient to close the existing funding gap and Staffordshire will continue to lobby for both additional funding and a fair and equitable mechanism for addressing cumulative deficits that should not impact on the Council's already stretched general resources.
- 29. It is Staffordshire's intention to pass on the full budget increase next year for the provision of SEND support; none of this funding rise will be used to repay historical deficits.
- 30. The Council recognises the financial pressures schools across Staffordshire are facing and, given the increase in Government funding, will increase funding to providers by as much as is affordable and fair, acknowledging the current pressures on the HNB and the depleted DSG balances which at the end of the current financial year will likely be in deficit by circa £8-10m.
- 31. For 2022-23 Special School budgets will be set based on:
 - a Minimum Funding Guarantee of 2.5% (higher than the MFG set by Government of 0%); ensuring that funding for all Special Schools, on a like for like basis, will increase next year by a minimum of 2.5%.
 - there will be no capping of school gains
- 32. Even with the additional Government funding a further significant overspend is anticipated in 2022/23. Accordingly, and working in partnership with Schools Forum, the Council must now bring forward a 'DSG deficit management plan' outlining the actions that can be taken to address and mitigate the existing shortfall as far as possible. This will sit alongside the wider service transformation plan.
- 33. As in previous years, the schools block will be ring-fenced in 2022-23, with the option to transfer 0.5% of the Schools Block funding into the central school services, high needs, or early years budgets, subject to the approval of Schools Forum. Given the pressures within the High Needs Block a request was made for a transfer of 0.5% in 2022-23 though this was rejected by Schools Forum at its meeting in November 2021.
- 34. Special Schools continue to be funded on a place plus top-up basis, the value of which is £10,000 in line with Government guidelines. Staffordshire County Council has commissioned 2,649 places at Staffordshire Special Schools, of which 2,095 places are at academies (at the time of writing this report).
- 35. From 1 April 2022 the Council will roll out a new Education Banding Tool to help calculate top up funding in a fair and consistent way. This is a needs led tool and will enable us to:
 - take a holistic view a child or young person's needs

- make calculations based on the support a child or young person needs to meet their educational outcomes and
- secure the special educational provision to meet their special education needs as detailed in their Education Health and Care Plan.
- 36. Pupil Referral Units (PRUs) continue to be funded as school-like entities on a place plus top-up basis. For 2022/23 Staffordshire County Council has commissioned 359 places at Staffordshire PRUs at a value of £10,000 per place in line with Government guidance.

Funding next year will also include adjustments for:

- To ensure PRUs see a comparable 2.5% rise next year, local authority funded top up payments (TRIG-8) for single rolled pupil will be increased from £7,450 to £7,635; however charges for school commissioned preventative places will remain unchanged.
- A further 'lump sum' contribution will be made of £0.121m for fixed overheads in line with other school funding arrangements (up from £0.118m in 2021/22).
- One pupil referral unit provides hospital-based tuition (the Darwin Centre) and receives a set payment to reflect these costs. The total budget allocation for hospital-based tuition at this PRU setting is £0.194m, an uplift of 2.5% compared to 2021/22 in line with other school funding rises.
- 37. The budgets for special schools and PRUs are detailed in Appendix 2.
- 38. Provision will continue to be made for Post-16 high needs colleges and independent providers in line with latest forecasts (circa £5m). In addition to this, the Council has commissioned 462 places FE colleges for the academic year 2022/23.
- 39. There is a special unit attached to three mainstream schools. Places in the units are included in the main formula budget and top up funding is received from the High Needs Block to ensure each placement is funded at £10,000 in line with Government guidelines. The total number of places for 2022/23 within these schools is 33.
