

- 1. www.findmystreet.co.uk. This. Website shows every street in England and Wales that is held in the National Street Gazetteer. This website is used by Staffordshire County Council to keep an up to date list of streets that are maintainable at public expense under s.36 of the Highways Act 1980. This website replaces the List of Streets previously held by the County Council. It provides evidence of the street name and whether it is maintained by the County Council.
- 2. Staffordshire County Council List of Streets dated 16/04/2018. This List provides Road Numbers which are not held by the Find My Street website.

Conclusions from information:

- 1. All routes apart from Route No, 1 (the majority of Fleets Lane and the application route the southern section of Grindon Footpath 12 shown on the Handover map for Grindon Parish and adjoining areas are still Highways Maintained at Public Expense, and are mainly C and D class public vehicular highways.
- 2. No footpaths or bridleways in the area (apart from the application route) are shown on the Handover map.
- 3. This is evidence that all the routes shown on the 1929 Handover map were considered by the County Surveyor to be public vehicular highways at that time.

Povey of the Staffordshire Moorlands Bridleways Preservation Group submitted an Application (Appendix A) for a Modification Order to upgrade Public Footpath Nos 95 and and the 96, Waterhouses Parish to public bridleway status on the Definitive Map of Public Rights of Way under the provisions of Section 53(3)(e)(ii) of the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981. The alleged public bridlepath (shown marked A-B-C on the plan attached as Appendix "B" to this report) runs from the River Hamps at Soles Coppice, through Soles Hollow to terminate at Slade House 1.3 The determination of Section 53 applications is a matter which is delegated to the Modification Order Applications (Minor) Sub-Committee of the County Planning Committee. The Highways Committee at as meeting on 2 September 1991 decided that the determination of all claims of ancient highway status sould be dealt with by the Modification Order Applications (Minor) Sub-Committee under the provisions of Section 53 of the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981, subject to the requirement for prior consultation with the Highways Committee where potential public vehicular rights were involved. This would allow the Highways Committee, in any particular case, to decide whether the historical evidence identified sarranted admission as an all purpose highway maintainable at the public expense rather than as a byway open to all traffic. 2 Summary 1.1 Prior to 1929, the responsibility for maintenance of unclassified roads in rural areas rested with District Councils. The Local Government Act 1929 provided for the transfer of this function to County Councils and, accordingly, Rural District Councils were required to compile schedules detailing the minor loads which were maintainable at the public expense. Evidence has been submitted which shows that the lines of Public Footpath Nos 95 and 96, Waterhouses Parish were included on the Rural District Roads Schedule for the former Mayfield Rural District as being highways maintainable at the public expense 3 Recommendation - That it be recommended to the Highways Committee:-(a) That the evidence submitted by Mrs. Povey, along with the evidence discovered by the County Council, is sufficient to show that public vehicular rights exist along the entire length of Public Formattee. of Public Footpath Nos 95 and 96, Waterhouses Parish. (b) That the lengths of Public Footpath shown marked A-B and B-C on the plan attached as Appendix B. Appendix B to this report be admitted as unclassified publicly maintainable highways. 4 Background

- 4.1 In support of her application, Mrs. Povey has submitted the following evidence.
 - (i) An extract from the Schedule of Rural District Roads compiled under the Liquid Government Act 1929.
 - (ii) A copy letter from the County Surveyor stating that the County Council have no recome of the road from Weags Barn to Slade House being extinguished.
 - (iii) A copy of the Yates Map of 1775.
 - (iv) A copy of the Second edition Yates Map of 1799.
- 4.2 The two editions of the Yates Map dated 1775 and 1799 show that a road/track linking States—with Weags Barn (to the north of Soles Coppice) has existed since at least 1775. It should be shown to the small scale of the Yates Map it is not possible to establish whether the shown coincides with the route claimed by Mrs. Povey. It should also be noted that, even though maps can show that a route physically existed at the date of the maps, the maps are not, in the evidence that the routes shown are public rights of way.
- 4.3 The extract from the Schedule of Rural District Roads compiled under the Local Government 1929 makes reference to a public road running from the River Hamps at Soles Hollow to Start for a distance of 1.56 miles. The route is also shown on the plan which accompanies the Scholar to 1929, the responsibility for maintenance of unclassified roads in the County in rural areas for District Councils. 5. Evidence submitted by the landowners/occupiers

- 5.1 The alleged public bridle path passes over land in the ownership of the National Trust. M. Richardson of Throwley Hall, Ilam and Mr. A.T. Philip of The Barn, Briergrove, Birch Vale. All of the above mentioned landowners have indicated that they are opposed to Mrs. Povey, and have, in recent years, taken steps to prevent the use of the public footpath by horse rules vehicles. They have not however produced any evidence to show that the public vehicular right to in the Rural District Roads Schedule have been stopped-up. (The comments/evidence submitted landowners is attached as Appendix "D" to this report).

- 6.2 The Waterhouses Parish Council have stated that they have no objection to the upgrading of the two public footpaths to bridleway status but have not submitted any evidence in support of the claim.
- 63 The Auto Cycle Union have stated that they support Mrs. Povey's claim for the upgrading of the paths to public bridleway status as members of the Trail Riders Federation "have been riding this route for many years"

Other evidence discovered by the County Council

- Despite an extensive search, no evidence has been found to show that the length of minor public road referred to in the Rural District Roads Schedule for Mayfield Rural District has been stopped-up. In the absence of evidence to the contrary, it must therefore be assumed that public vehicular rights still exist along the route claimed by Mrs. Povey.
- 12 There does not appear to be an enclosure award for the area but the Ilam Tithe Award of 1938 shows the route in two parts. The first section of the route from the ford at the River Hamps through Soles Hollow to a point just north of Throwley Moor Farm is shown as being untithed. The remainder of the path from a point just north of Throwley Moor Farm to Slade House is shown running through tithed land.
- 7.3 The route claimed by Mrs. Povey is also shown on the first edition of the 1" to 1 mile Ordnance Survey Map circa 1836 as being a through route (copy attached as Appendix "E"). As pointed out in paragraph 3.2 above however, it should be noted that although Ordnance Survey maps etc can show that a route physically existed at a certain point in time, these maps are not, in themselves, evidence that the routes they show were public rights of way at those dates.
- 7.4 The deposited plans and the book of references for the Leek Caldon Low and Hartington Light Railways (1897) (copy attached as Appendix "F") shows the land over which the northernmost section of Public Footpath No. 96 passes. The Plans show two routes over this land, one coinciding with the route of Public Footpath No. 96 and one running from the line of Public Footpath No. 96 in a north resterly direction to a footbridge over the river Hamps. This land is shown on the deposited plans as being plot no. 23, and described in the Book of References as a "field, road and footpath" owned by Earl Cathcart, Ilam Parish Meeting, Mayfield Rural District Council" and occupied by "Iames Howson".
